er name is well known amongst Japanese evangelical Christians in Canada, and many of you have known

and loved her as friend and co-worker. Margaret's Christian life displayed three important characteristics.

First, she was obedient. From the day when, as a teenager, she quit struggling and opened her heart to Jesus. Her one desire was to obey and serve Him faithfully. She learned under Mr. Harry to teach Sunday School in Japanese fishing villages, and was thrilled to be able to tell the Gospel story to those who had never heard. On Mr. Harry's death, Margaret took lead-

ship and expanded the out reach to East Vancou ver. Then, in 1941, war in the Pacific erupted. All Japanese living in coastal B.C. became "enemy aliens" and were uprooted and re-located to the Kootenay area, and the embryo Sunday School work was shattered. But this was God's

moment. Margaret heard and obeyed His call to follow her friends into their exile and to show His compassion at this difficult time.

Second, she was focused. From 1942 when she first went out to the Kootenays, right up to her retirement in 1980, she was totally focused on evangelism to the Japanese. She would

settle in a community, set up children, youth and other groups, then enlist others to take over, and move on to the next challenge. In 1946 the Canadian Japanese Mission was organized and Margaret became its longest-serving worker. She was also a walking dictionary of all things concerning the C.J.M., its work and workers.

Third, she was adventurous. How Margaret loved a new challenge! Without that spirit of adventure she could never have

accomplished all she did. She also loved, at times, to drop everything and set out on a moment's ce for a get-away trip and

notice for a get-away trip and that is just what she did on November 5, 2004. Margaret never feared death, and when it came it all seemed so natural for her to just drop what she was doing and go off on her next venture. How wonderful to know that her final venture is to her heavenly home prepared in advance for her.

Sayonara to an Evacuation Missionary

excerpt from Nikkei Voice Margaret was reared in a godly Baptist home. She became interested in the Japanese people even before the war. Befriended by "home missionaries" Mr. & Mrs. Harry of the Japan Evangelistic Band, she would faithfully visit and hold Sunday Schools for Japanese children living in cannery settlements such as the Celtic Cannery on Sea Island (now the Vancouver International Airport). This voluntary spirit became the "springboard" for her "calling" to work among the Japanese of Canada.

When her desire to do overseas missions was abruptly snuffed with the bombing of Pearl Harbour, she saw that the Lord had opened another door. In June of 1942, Miss Ridgway followed the Japanese ... into the ghost town of interior British Columbia.

The rest is well documented history...

Editor's Note: The Canadian Japanese Mission which was organized in 1946, today, is called the Canadian Japanese Ministries. In 2006, we will celebrate 60 years of evangelical Japanese outreach and ministries in Canada.

Lethbridge Japanese Christian Fellowship

en years have passed since we first came to Lethbridge when we were students at Prairie Bible College. Since then, studies have occupied our time, but now we are grateful to be in God's ministry in Lethbridge. We want to thank our individual supporters and the churches both in Canada and Japan for your prayers and financial support. We appreciate you from the depth of our hearts

In February, the annual general meeting of our fellowship was held. We have decided to become a purpose driven church. I believe, every church needs to ask, "Why do we exist?" Until we know what our church exists for, we have no foundation, no motivation, and no direction for ministry. Our first task is to define our purpose and to recapture a clear vision of what God wants to do in and through our church family.

The Bible says, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it, love your neighbor as yourself". (Matthew 22:37-40) The Bible further says, "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19-20) I clarified the five purposes of the church with the two passages of Jesus

Christ: ① Worship - to love the Lord with all our heart; ② Ministry/Service to other people - to love our neighbor as ourselves; ③ Evangelism/Outreach - to go and make disciples; ④ Fellowship in God's Family - to baptize; ⑤ Discipleship to be Christlike - to teach. All the members at the AGM agreed to build our church with the five purposes and to apply them to everything we do.

We prepared our budget prayerfully with the five purposes in mind. Although our church is mainly made up of students, God has blessed with an increase of offerings to his work. God has been good!

There are four Japanese pastors in Lethbridge. Pastor Takashima is the pastor in the Japanese United Church. He has invited us to do music, give testimonies, and to join their activities. Pastor Shimoda and Pastor Sato work in Canadian churches. We started our prayer meeting in February, aiming to pray for the Japanese people in Lethbridge.

Pastor Takashima has also invited me to minister in Japanese to a small group of Japanese in Taber, Alberta, 60 km. east of Lethbridge. The members there have been thirsty for the Word of God in Japanese since their church closed some years ago.

Once every three weeks we have an English prayer meeting with the Nisei people. We begin with supper followed by Bible study and prayer. In February, we were grateful that missionary Takashi Ota of Wycliffe Bible Translators came to preach to our Nisei people. Please pray for our Niseis' spiritual growth.

Please continue to pray for our overall ministry in Lethbridge. \Box

After attending the memorial service of Margaret Ridgway on November 12th, I was reminded of the wise woman in 2 Samuel 20: 15-22. As a result of her intercession, the city was spared and the woman was regarded as a mother of Israel. (vs. 19-NKJ)

Mary and I are grateful to the Lord for bringing Margaret into our lives. Before Mary became a Christian, the Lord laid upon Margaret's heart to share Christ with her back in the early fifties. One night while Mary was away at a dance, Margaret sat and waited on the porch until 2 am. and pleaded with her to accept Christ. Her love for the Lord and the Japanese, together with her spirit of evangelism, were a real challenge to me then and throughout my ministry.

Margaret will be remembered as "a mother in Israel" by her many spiritual children. She has passed the torch of the Gospel to us, and now we who have received her nurturing, must take the responsibility of this light to the fellow Nikkeis, our kinsmen in the flesh. \Box

My Personal Testimony

n December 24, in 1968, one event occupied the attention of the whole world. American spaceship, Apollo was about to step onto the moon. The astronauts were sending the Christmas message from the moon. Genesis Chapter one was read. I was listening to the message with a special excitement, because I just became a Christian ten days before this historical event occurred.

At that time, I was accepted to be a policeman. To me, a policeman reflected an image of a father, because I was raised without one. Soon after I became a policeman, I felt something inside me was missing.

I felt insecure because I did not have a map for my life. I was suffering the gap between an ideal image of myself and reality of myself. During that time, two words stayed in my heart. One was the confession of St. Augustine; since we were made toward God, we cannot get the peace until we are in Him. The other was the confession of Paul; "I know I am rotten through and through so far as my old sinful nature is concerned. No matter which way I turn, I can't make myself do right. I want to, but I can't. When I want to do good, I don't. And when I try not to do wrong, I do it anyway. But if I am doing what I don't want to do, I am not really the one doing it: the sin within one is doing it." (Roman 7:18-20) I also realized the sinful nature of human being by reading 'Kokoro' written by Soseki Natsume, 'Sin and

Punishment' and 'Brothers of Karamazov' written by Dostoevsky. And through those books, I came to know that I am sinful before God and people. At that time I listened to a radio program by Mr. & Mrs. Frens, who were missionaries with TEAM. I became a Christian through their radio program. I

> was the first fruit for their work through the radio when I decided to trust Jesus and gave my life to Him.

God has been faithful to me ever since I accepted Him. "I will not forsake the people who come to me". His word was true and is always true. After I decided not to become a policeman, I worked for a Christian publisher, Word of Life for four years. As my desire of studying the Bible became stronger, I decided to go to the Kansai Bible Institute. Following graduation, I worked with a missionary and with several churches. Later I came

back to Nagoya to help the work of TEAM missionaries, Mr. and Mrs. Frens, who were my spiritual parents. They started the meet-

ings from one small office room in Nagoya, called 'Life Center.' A couple of years later, we built other churches in various places. During that time, Mr. & Mrs. Frens retired and went back to America. I remained there for 10 years as their pastor while supporting myself. In January of 2001, I went to Seto Salem Church until the fall of 2003. After that, with the prayer of Jabez 'Enlarge our spiritual territory.' we went to America seeking an opportunity of church planting amongst the Japanese people there. In spite of our intension, God gave us His Word 'Go in the strength you have...Am I not sending you? (Judge 6:14). In His perfect timing, He directed us to Calgary after ten months in American.
