Everyone expressed a very positive note on this first attempt to bring a better understanding of how to prepare the returnees back into the Japanese society and into their new life in the church. A goal is to have a network in all regions of so that the returnees will have a contact upon their return. It was agreed that another conference should be held again next year at the same time and location.

One of the blessings for me, amongst many, was the opportunity to meet and converse with numbers of Christian leaders from Japan and overseas. The returnees too, were excited about having a conference of this nature where

area. It was wonderful to hear of their experiences in Canada and how they came to trust in Christ. Two of the young men who were there spent time in Lethbridge and Three Hills, Alberta. They were Takafumi Miyasaka and Kensaku Higashi. They also attended Sunnyside Camp in the last few years as well. Takafumi will be involved in giving leadership to the newly formed network for returnees to the Tokyo area. The network ministry will be extremely important as it will be the focal point of contact for the returnees to Christian fellowship and possibly a home church.

It is most encouraging to see Japan's youth touched by the Gospel of Jesus Christ. God is indeed doing a great thing beyond what we had ever expected. Let's continue to pray for Japan, it's churches, pastors and it's youth. \Box

kyo. Those in attendance at the conference were the returnees who had accepted Christ in a foreign country, seekers who lived in foreign countries, churches and Christian groups who had dealt with the new believers in foreign countries and the local churches and Christian organizations in Japan. This conference was held for the advancement of missions to Japanese people in foreign countries and for the chance to make a cooperative network with domestic and overseas Christians. The conference provided us with a booth to introduce the Japanese ministry in Lethbridge and also through my presentation.

Mr. Nori Kanashiro and Satoshi had a meeting with the Support Committee for the Lethbridge ministry. Mr. Kanashiro shared the history of CJM and thanked them for their faithful prayer and financial support for this ministry in Canada. We further discussed our future ministry and follow-up of the returnees who had accepted Christ during their stay in Lethbridge. Takafumi Miyasaka whose home church is the Tachikawa Evangelical Free Church in Tokyo, was present with us. He accepted Christ and was baptized in Lethbridge in 2006 and has now returned to Japan. He has now joined the Lethbridge ministry Support group as one of its mem-

bers. He is willing to be a bridge between the returnees, who are not connected to a church, the Lethbridge ministry-supporting group and with us. We are thankful that our network has gradually spread out.


