Greetings! The winter was quite tough for our ministry with the youth and families.

On a personal note, my family and I found our world rapidly shrinking. Small unexpected events became huge mountains in our minds that threw life into a chaotic mess. Under normal circumstances I'm sure these would just be small bumps in the road that we would easily overcome. But now as our world and perspective narrows, small things become big - and big things become enormous.

I can say that our students are going through the same thing, except they are even less prepared to cope. Students are going through so many transitions already, they are asking themselves such large questions, and there are very big unknowns in their life (identity, future, belonging, etc.). COVID-19 has amplified this and our students are struggling to develop coping strategies. Our provincial government has just recently announced another (third) lockdown where students will be staying home for school full-time once again. I know that the students are happy about this.

Recently we have been watching the show 'The Chosen' together. It is an episodic show that chronicles the life of the followers of Jesus. It is unique in that it is the first crowd-funded show of its kind, and the show's focus is not on Jesus himself but on His followers. Jesus, of course, makes an appearance but most of the time is focused on Jesus' followers like Peter, Andrew, Mary Magdalene, and Matthew. The show is really great in transporting us into the world of the New Testament, where

there are two empires at war, Rome, and the Kingdom of God that Jesus is ushering in. You really get the sense of the oppression and pain that people are experiencing and the real hope that Jesus brings to the situation.

I think the show has been great in de-centering ourselves and widening our world as we are transported to another time and place yet still meet the same Jesus. Jesus is, of



course, dealing with very different issues and people than we see today but his Kingdom values and ethic of love remain the same. We have the chance to dissect and reflect on each episode in a discussion after and they are always very vibrant.

Going forward I believe utilizing forms of media and watching them in 'watch parties' together will be extremely helpful in assisting the youth to expand their worldview and perspective as their walls are closing in due to lockdowns. Our vaccine schedule seems ahead of schedule so we are also looking ahead to when mostly everyone who is eligible is vaccinated and we can gain some flexibility to meet in small settings.
